



Notes for Guidance

General

In thesenotes, a personwho gives a temporary event notice is called a opremises usero.

The police and local authority exercising environmentahealth functions may intervene on the grounds of any of the four licensing objectives (the prevention of crime and disorder, public safety, the prevention of public nuisance and the protection of children from harm) to prevent the occurrence of an eventat which permitted temporary activities are to take place or to agree a modification of the arrangement for such an event. However, the licensing authority will intervene of its own volition in the case describe delow.

First, it will issue a countemotice if there is an objection to a late temporary event notice (see note 8 below).

Secondly it may issue a notice in relation to its decision to impose conditions on a temporary event notice (see note 2 below).

Thirdly, it will issue a countemotice if the first, second third and fifth of the limits set out below would be exceeded. If any of the limits below are breached or if a countemotice has been issued, any licensable activities taking place would be unauthorised and the



Note 2

For the purposes of the Licensing Act 2003, õpremises ömeansany place. Premises will therefore not always be a building with a formal addressand postcode. Premises can include, for example, public parks, recreation grounds and privateland.

If a premises/icenceor club premisescertificatehaseffectin relation to the premises or any part of the premises which you want to use to carry on licensable activities, it is possible that any conditions which apply to the licenceor certificate may be imposed on the temporary event notice if certain pre-conditions are met.
